

HALLOWEEN COSTUMES

Equitable and Inclusive Education Best Practices

At the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board, we work collectively to fulfill our vocational call as Christians by ensuring that all are welcomed, included and valued. As a system we know that equity and inclusion are valuable contributors to overall student success and as a faith-filled community we are committed to ensuring that all students are engaged and feel welcomed and included in every aspect of school life. The DPCDSB seeks to uphold the human dignity of all as we are all created in the image and likeness of God.

Why is this Important?

When choosing a costume for Halloween, be mindful of the way your choices impact those around you. Ensure that your costume choice does not dehumanize anyone, in particular, any group that experiences oppression due to systemic barriers.

It is important to note that in compliance with Ontario's Human Rights Code, The Code prohibits actions that discriminate against people based on a protected ground in a protected social area.

Some of the protected areas include, but are not limited to: Ancestry, Colour, Race, Ethnic Origin, Place of Origin, Religion, Creed, Disability, Gender Identity, Gender Expression, Sex and Sexual Orientation.

Impact over Intent

Concerns arise when people consider using characteristics, stereotypes and stigmas of a culture – clothing, accessories, skin color, and/or religion – and replicating them into a costume. Consider impact over intent. Whether it is intentional or not, wearing certain costumes has real consequences and negatively impacts the people that deal with this kind of discrimination on a daily basis.

Safe and Inclusive

It is important to keep Halloween safe and inclusive by leaving culturally insensitive, racist and sexist stereotypes out. Protecting and upholding the human rights and dignities of all individuals is a shared responsibility and choosing a costume that is offensive, hurtful or potentially harassing and/or discriminatory in nature goes against the Catholic Social Teachings and values of inclusion here at the DPCDSB.

Culture is not a costume. Trying on another race, culture or identity contributes to stereotypes and causes real harm to communities that have been historically marginalized and who continue to face systemic oppression today.



Gender Identity is not a costume. Gender stereotypes have been used to perpetuate harm. Should you choose to dress as the opposite gender, consider whether you are mocking gender traits or enforcing harmful gender stereotypes.



HALLOWEEN SPIRIT DAY DRESS IN COSTUME OR IN ORANGE & BLACK

Ask yourself:

- · Does this costume make fun of human traits, identities, cultures, or race?
- Does this costume reduce culture or identity to stereotypes?
- Who might be harmed by my choice of costume?
- Is this costume depicting and perpetuating a stereotype or stigma associated with a particular race, culture, gender, ability or religion?
- Does this costume include a replication of a garment or item that is a significant component of a particular religion or culture of which I do not identify with?
- Is this costume depicting a historical time-period where that look/costume is now considered offensive and discriminatory?
- Does this costume represent elements of a culture or cultural practice that is being commodified for consumption?
- Can I confidently say that this costume choice would not be considered offensive to a particular race, ethnic origin, ability, gender or religion?

Remember:

Halloween can be a time for fun. Think critically and creatively when choosing a costume that honours the dignity of each human person, so that everyone can enjoy themselves.



Costume ideas should avoid the following:

(Please note that this is not an exhaustive list)

- · Any cultural stereotype
- Blackface, Brownface
- The Covid-19 pandemic
- · A person with differing abilities
- People with mental illness
- · Body shaming
- · Body objectification
- Animal cruelty
- · Culturally specific references: e.g. Day of the Dead, Hula
- Differing lived realities e.g. homelessness, imprisonment
- Anything trivializing
- Anything mocking gender identity



Kids listen more than you think. Caring adults have an important role to play in helping kids make decisions about their health such as vaping. Teens say parents are the biggest influence in their lives.

VAPING IS NOT HARMLESS

Some risks for kids:

- · Addiction to nicotine
- · Difficulty learning and reduced impulse control
- · Increased anxiety and stress
- · Lung damage and changes to how the brain grows and develops

Young people who vape are more likely to start smoking cigarettes and try other drugs.

SIGNS OF VAPING











TALKING EARLY AND OFTEN IS ONE OF THE BEST WAYS TO KEEP KIDS VAPE-FREE

TIPS FOR TALKING ABOUT VAPING

Ask questions and listen more than you talk

Ask open-ended questions and restate what you hear. Ask:

"What do you think about vaping?" or "So it sounds to me like..."

Create a safe space

Be open, non-judgmental, caring and understanding. Say something like:

"Of course, I hope you avoid vaping, nicotine addiction is hard and I don't want that for you; but that would never change the way I feel about you."

You don't have to be an expert.

Be honest if there's something you don't know and take opportunities to learn together. Say something like,

"I don't even know how much nicotine is in vapes; we'll have to Google that."

Practice skills

Plan and practice what they could say to their friends. They could say:

"I'm sure there will be kids vaping at this party; have you thought about how you might avoid that pressure?"

Keep checking in

Kids' experiences and pressures are always changing, so keep talking. For

"I've heard that kids are vaping more since COVID started. Have you noticed any change since returning to school?"

Timing is important

Look for opportunities when you have their attention. For example when picking them up from school:

"I've noticed quite a few kids vaping out front lately - what's up with that?"

- Listen to music.
- · Talk with a friend or other trusted person.
- · Go for a walk or choose your favourite way to get moving.

stress:

Have a shower or bath to relax.

HOW TO RESIST THE PRESSURE TO VAPE

Delay answering:

"Can't right now, I'll meet up with you later."

Suggest something else:

"I don't want to right now, wanna play some ball?"

Make a joke:

"Thanks, but I'm already addicted to air!"





My School Day

Quick Start for Students and Parents

Fall 2024



You can find the app - it's free to download! - on the App Store (IOS) or Google Play (Androld) by

- · Searching in the store for "My School Day"
- Going to https://myschooldav.app/download in the browser on your phone
- Using the QR code at right.





Make sure to allow it to receive notifications when asked - the school will use them to send out important reminders, information and alerts.

2. Select your school

The first time you start the app you will need to select your school. Choose a province, school district, and finally your school from the lists provided, and tap "confirm". This only needs to be done once.

Follow channels.

Channels let the school administration and teachers send out information specific to your classes and activities, so you get only those notifications for your classes and those of interest to the entire school. To subscribe to channels:

- · Tap on the "Classes" Icon
- · Tap "Follow Channels" in the menu
- Tap the checkboxes for the channels you are interested in
- Tap on the "Done" button.

Remember to check back regularly for new channels that your teachers may have added.



4. Enter your classes

Tapping on the classes icon also gives you an option to set up your timetable. Select that option and enter your class names and select colours and icons. You can also enter morning, lunch, and after school activities. When you tap on "Done", the app will fill in your timetable.

Access school information, links and files

The school and teachers will add links and files that provide resources to the school community such as course materials for remote learning, health advisories, and other school, district, and provincial Information. To access these school-wide and channel-specific resources:

Tap the Info icon at the right hand side of the tab bar:

Remember to check back regularly for new resources that your teachers may have added.




